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Legislative Update

The Honolulu City Council Committee on Budget is still in the process of reviewing the City Budget for the Fiscal Year 2018. The public meeting for the second proposed amendments will be on May 16th at 9am. Councilmember Joey Manahan proposed funding for play apparatus and park improvements in District 7, including Kalihi Waena Neighborhood Park, Mokauea Street Mini Park, Hoa Aloha Neighborhood Park and Makalapa Neighborhood Park under the Executive Capital Budget and Program, Bill 26(2017). Councilmember Manahan also appropriated \$550,000 for Salt Lake District Park swimming pool improvements to make sure that funding is available to continue on with the project. He will ensure that the appropriations to improve our parks moves forward.

Bill 13 (2017), CD1 - After roughly two years of working with business owners and residents in the Iwilei and Kalihi areas to work on solutions to address the growing homeless population in the areas, Bill 13 (2017) was introduced in February 2017 to supplement the housing, hygiene centers, and navigation center efforts that are already being planned and constructed in Council District 7, which Councilmember Joey Manahan represents. After numerous meetings, hearings, testimony, and news coverage Bill 13 (2017), CD1 (CD1 amends the maps to cover city jurisdiction) passed third reading. The area that Bill 13 (2017), CD1 that will prohibit sitting or lying on public sidewalks in areas zoned for commercial and business activities are in the Kalihi zone bordered by Waiakamilo Road, Kohou Street, North King Street, and Dillingham Boulevard; and Iwilei Streets including, Iwilei/Pacific, ending at Iwilei/North King, Sumner Street beginning at the intersection of Sumner/Pine and ending at Sumner/North Nimitz, Pine Street from Pine/Sumner to Pine/Kuwili, and Kuwili Street beginning at the dead end mauka of Pine and ending at Kuwili/Iwilei. The Honolulu Police Department will conduct thirty days of education prior to enforcement.

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[Airport Area TOD Plan](#)

The Airport Area Transit-Oriented Development (TOD) Plan is focused on the areas around the rail stations at Pearl Harbor Naval Base (Radford Drive), Honolulu International Airport, and Lagoon Drive. This plan is moving forward as the City conducted its 3rd and last Community Workshop on April 26th and Advisory Committee Meeting on April 27th, which discussed the Public Review Draft of the Airport Area TOD. It addresses new development, circulation improvements, and public spaces. The plan recommends the following:

- New mixed-use communities on underutilized lands near Makalapa Gate
- Enhanced connectivity across H-1 and major area roadways
- Placemaking and improved navigational elements around the Airport
- New bicycle lanes and improved access to Keehi Lagoon Park
- Preservation of high-demand industrial zoning
- Multi-story industrial/commercial development
- Convenience retail near the rail stations

The next step that the City will be taking is to move the plan into action:

- Receive and incorporate comments on the Public Review Draft Plan
- Planning Commission approval
- Adoption of the City Council
- Draft and adopt TOD zoning and Special District regulations around each of the three stations
- Identify incentives and funding resources
- Form partnerships with interested property owners
- Advance short-term (0-5 years) improvements

[Relocation of OCCC Coming to Fruition](#)

A Town Hall meeting to discuss the progress and findings on the future of the Oahu Community Correctional Center was held on April 24, 2017 at the Aloha Stadium's Hospitality Room. It provided residents of several communities on Oahu with a chance to comment on proposals to relocate OCCC to Halawa Valley (at old quarantine station or behind Halawa Prison), next to the Mililani Tech Park or redevelop the current site in Kalihi (on Dillingham).

As expected, residents generally opposed the siting of the new jail in their community.

1. Mililani residents pointed out the covenant that is provided for the use of the land in Mililani which needs to be amended.
2. Halawa residents opposed the two sites, the old animal quarantine station and a smaller area behind Halawa Prison, saying that there was no access for public transportation which would be important to encourage visitations to the incarcerated population.
3. The current OCCC would require construction of a new multi-story facility on one end of the property in order, while allowing the current population to be housed in the existing modules. However, the current OCCC has and will remain to be a stigma for Kalihi, especially with public schools located nearby.

There are plus and minuses associated with all the sites and adjustments will need to be made at whichever site is selected.
