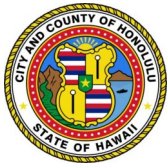

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Hale Mauliola Lease Extension



The lease for the homeless navigation center located in Councilmember Manahan's Council District was extended for four years to 2023 to continue serving the homeless population who are then able to get back on their feet and obtain housing on their own. Councilmember Manahan is a major proponent for advocating for innovative initiatives to serve those individuals who are houseless and are in need of assistance and may also be underserved. Renewing the lease of Hale Mauliola really speaks to the success of this navigation center and program," reflected Councilmember Manahan.



Hale Mauliola opened as a pilot program on November 19, 2015 with 19 residents living in converted shipping containers while being offered an array of social service assistance, including substance abuse treatment, jobs and permanent housing. Out of 556 people who left Hale Mauliola, nearly half of the former residents have moved on to "stable housing." Councilmember Manahan remarked that, "At the end

of the day, the rewards are immeasurable when we can provide shelter, safety, and peace of mind for those who need it most."

120th Anniversary of Philippine Independence Day Celebrated at Washington Place

The Philippine Consul General Joselito A. Jimeno, Governor David Ige, City and State Legislators, High Ranking U.S. Military Officers and multiple Filipino Organizations celebrated the 120th Anniversary of Philippine Independence Day at Washington Place on June 12, 2018. June 12, 1989 marks the Philippines independence from over 300 years of Spanish rule.

The relationship of Hawaii and the Philippines has always been an important one, from the Sakadas recruitment of Filipinos from the Philippines which began on 1906 to work in the sugar plantation in Hawaii, to Filipinos now representing the largest ethnic group in the State. The commitment to strengthen ties between Hawaii and the Philippines has been nurtured by culture and shared values of freedom and democracy are recognized by both Governor Ige and Consul General Jimeno. On October 2017, a Memorandum of Understanding was adopted between the League of Philippine Provinces and State of Hawaii in order to understand, expand cooperation and opportunities in Hawaii and the Philippines.

Philippine Independence Day symbolizes unity and patriotism for freedom, democracy, and sovereignty. Through the perseverance and strive for independence, Filipinos are known today to be the most humble, hardworking, loyal and dedicated people, not just in the state of Hawaii but everywhere in the world.

TheBus and HandiVan Fare Recommendation

On June 26th, 2018 the Committee on Transportation was briefed by the Rate Commission on its recommendations for TheBus and HandiVan fare.

The Rate Commission was established by voters in 2017, following a recommendation by the Honolulu Charter Commission. The Rate Commission's duties are to review the fares, rates, and other charges for the use of any and all modes of the multimodal municipal transportation system.

After nine meetings and issues considered for both TheBus and HandiVan, the Rate Commission recommended the following:

1. Discontinue two year passes. These should not be needed with the new Holo card
2. Implement bus fare increase of 25 cents on January 1, 2019
3. Implement HandiVan increase of 25 cents on January 1, 2019– from \$2.00 to \$2.25
4. Raise the social service agency (who have regular clientele who rise HandiVan fare by 25 cents on January 1, 2019)
5. Reduce the HandiVan fare to \$1.00 for very low income who qualify under Supplemental Social Income (SSI)
6. Implement no more than one fare increase a year

The Department of Transportation Services (DTS) will consider these recommendations and will submit their final proposal to the City Council for review and approval.

Missile Defense Agency Open House Meeting For Homeland Defense Radar-Hawaii Plans

In June, the Missile Defense Agency (MDA) held open house meetings on Oahu the week of June 18, 2018 at Sunset Beach Elementary School, Ke'ehi Lagoon Memorial Park, and Wai'anae High School to talk one-on-one with MDA representatives and local installation representatives about the Homeland Defense Radar -- Hawaii plans. The 2017 National Defense Authorization Act requires the MDA to develop a plan to procure and field a "discrimination radar" to improve the defense of Hawaii. The MDA in cooperation with the U.S. Air Force and U.S. Army is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to evaluate potential environmental impacts from proposed construction and operation of a Homeland Defense Radar -- Hawaii (HDR-H). In-Flight Interceptor Communication System Data Terminal; and associated support facilities, utilities, and infrastructure to protect the homeland against threats from rogue nations.

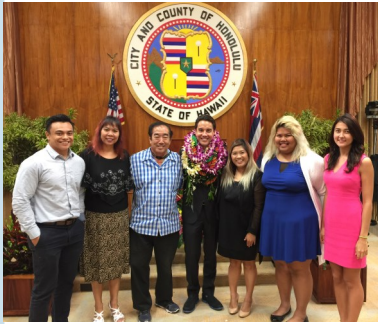
The proposed radar would provide enhanced capabilities for the U.S. Ballistic Missile Defense to track and discriminate (i.e., identify and classify) long-range ballistic missile threats. It would optimize the defensive capability of the U.S. inventory of Ground-Based Midcourse interceptors and counter evolving missile threats in the Pacific Region, including Hawaii.

An EIS will be prepared for the following locations:

1. Kuaokala Ridge (1 site location) -- near the western tip of the island of Oahu, located adjacent to the U.S. Air Force Kaena Point Satellite Tracking Station, and located within the Kuaokala Game Management Area; and
2. U.S. Army's Kahuku Training Area (2 site locations) -- Near the northern end of Oahu, located on the northern slopes of the Ko'olau Mountain Range, and it is a U.S. Army training area managed by the U.S. Army Hawaii.

Environmental resources to be analyzed are: Airspace & air quality, biological resources, cultural resources, hazardous materials & waste and health & safety, land use & recreation, water, transportation, coastal environment, geology & soils, utilities, socioeconomics (including environmental justice), visual aesthetics, and noise.

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District 5 Kalihi Community Policing Team Meet & Greet



On Wednesday, June 20, 2018 at the Moanalua Terrace Community Center, representatives from Neighborhood Security Watch and Citizen's Patrol groups joined Honolulu Police Department's District 5 Community Policing Team (CPT) at a gathering and meet and greet. The volunteers had the opportunity to have their questions answered from the District administrators. The District 5 CPT also conducted a short presentation on how to improve the Neighborhood Security Watch or Citizen's Patrol groups, along with news, highlights, and crime trends that are occurring in our district.

Attendees of the meeting also had the special opportunity to meet the HPD District 5 new commander, Major Darren Izumo who was also joined by Captain Stephen Silva and CPT Sergeant Bryan Oato.

Councilmember Manahan thanks all Council District 7 neighbors for their dedication to keeping our neighborhoods and communities safe. Together, we all can work for a better community. Members of the NSW/CP groups are the most important element of the program and serve our communities as the eyes and ears (what they observe and hear in terms of suspicious activity) that play vital role and link to solving crime.

The NSW program was introduced in Hawaii by HPD in 1980. At the time, it was known as the Good Neighbor program and Block Watch program. Since then, it has evolved into the NSW program with hundreds of "watches" across Oahu. Individual watches range in size actively participating in this community-based security effort. Because there are more private citizens than officers, it is more likely that you, your neighbors, or others in the community will be the first to see suspicious behavior or illegal activity.

Councilmember Manahan and HPD CPT encourages those who are interested in starting up a Neighborhood Security Watch and Citizens Patrol in their neighborhood to follow these simple steps:

1. Have the desire to start an NSW/CP for your neighborhood.
2. Set a date, time, and location for the initial training meeting.
3. Contact HPD CPT District 5 at 723-8231 to set up the meeting for officers to train the group, and maybe offer assistance in flyer for the group to pass around the neighborhood.
4. At completion of initial training meeting, a first NSW or CP walk will be scheduled and set.
5. Your team will be online and operational as an official NSW/CP partnering with the Honolulu Police Department in fighting and reducing crime in your neighborhood.

NSW/CP program members are educated on the following: Operation identification, residential security inspections, reporting suspicious activities to 911, and how to describe a suspect.
