On Monday, June 29, 2020, Councilmember Manahan and Councilmember Fukunaga met with Kalihi Valley and Makalapa constituents to discuss the Restricted Parking Zones (RPZ) program. The RPZ program includes having parking permits for residents to park on the street fronting their homes. Street parking is often unavailable due to non-residents parking in these neighborhoods.

After the success of the pilot RPZ program in Kalihi Valley, the pilot RPZ program is now fully implemented in Kalihi Valley and is a model for future RPZ programs throughout the island.

Neighbors in Makalapa are working to implement a RPZ program in their neighborhood. To get this program going it takes the support of community-driven-efforts and its neighbors coming together to work in collaboration with the City.

Also at the meeting Councilmember Manahan and Councilmember Fukunaga bid a warm farewell to former Kalihi Valley Neighborhood Board Chair Michael McDonald who is moving off island. Chair McDonald had a lot to do with the success of the RPZ Program in Kalihi Valley.

The Office of Councilmember Manahan would like to extend our appreciation to the City's Department of Environmental Services (ENV) for their diligent work in addressing the bulky item/illegal dumping concerns in the City and County of Honolulu and especially within Council District 7. Most recently, ENV has worked with neighbors to address illegal dumping on roads like but not limited to: Kamehameha IV Road, Long Lane, Kama Lane, and Gulick Avenue to mention a few. Yet, the work to address the illegal dumping concerns in various hot-spots is ongoing, we commend their hard work in ensuring the safety and well-being of our neighbors by providing services to remove refuse in an efficient and legal manner.

To make an appointment for bulky items:

To schedule an online appointment, you may schedule a bulky item appointment on www.opala.org. For those who do not have online access, may call ENV at (808) 768-3200 during normal business hours (Mon-Fri 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.). All scheduled appointments for bulky item pickup are on a specific date and items need to be curbside no earlier than 6 p.m. the night before collection.

To report illegal dumping:

In order to prevent being penalized, the City is encouraging residents to take video or photos of the offenders in the act and license plate of their vehicles then report it to the police or the City's Department of Environmental Services at (808) 768-3200. 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

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On Wednesday, July 8, 2020, during the City Council's July Council meeting, the City Council unanimously passed Resolution 20-164, FD1, URGING THE GOVERNOR TO TAKE ADDITIONAL MEASUREMENTS TO LIMIT TRAVEL-RELATED SPREAD OF COVID-19 TO KEEP OAHU SAFE FOR RESIDENTS AND VISITORS ALIKE.

The purpose of Resolution 20-164, FD1 is for Governor Ige to seriously consider delaying the implementations of its plans to allow bypassing of the mandatory quarantine for incoming passengers until such time after August 1 and when COVID-19 cases on the mainland and in Hawaii have abated, and if the August 1 start date is not delayed, that the Governor is urged to take additional measures, in addition to requiring a negative COVID-19 test prior to boarding, temperature screening, and administration of health questionnaire, in order to limit the travel-related spread of COVID-19 and keep Oahu residents safe.

Resolution 20-164, FD1 include the following precautionary steps:

- Requiring incoming travelers with a negative pre-boarding test to take a second follow-up diagnostic viral test within seven days of the initial test in order to confirm the negative result, (test could be paid from an additional incoming passenger fee);
- Working with private laboratories already processing tests in Hawai'i to significantly ramp up testing capacity;
- Implementing effective tracking and contact tracing of incoming passengers, including developing a mobile phone application, or "app," to track and trace persons with whom an infected traveler has come into contact, and mandating its use by travelers;
- Developing a surveillance system to monitor high-risk settings in the tourism industry and providing testing for industry employees who come into frequent contact with visitors;
- Ensuring that the systems and resources are in place to effectively enforce the mandatory 14-day self-quarantine for travelers who have not undergone and passed pre-boarding testing;
- Ensuring that the information about the pre-boarding test requirement and these additional measures is well publicized to alert those with plans to travel to Hawai'i.
